

MESSAGE FROM REV LESLEY

Dear Friends

Looking back over the past 15 months, Wesley Chapel has faced three major challenges. The first challenge was how to be church during a pandemic, when we haven't been able to worship together and share in fellowship. The second challenge has been moving out of the Lower Hall and entering into a new relationship with the Harrogate Homeless Project and having building work done to enable this. The third challenge was losing David, our much loved Premises Manager. And, we have missed him greatly over these past months.

One challenge would have made our church life difficult, but we've had three to deal with.

I think we will always miss David. But in the very near future, a premises manager or caretaker will be appointed. And, there is hope ahead with our other two challenges. With Covid regulations lifting, we're now back in church for worship and, soon, we might be able to sing again! The Upper Hall building work is complete and we have a lovely new kitchen, posh new loos and an up to date AV system.

We're now in a position to develop our partnership working with the Wesley Centre. Wesley Chapel members have already helped out in getting the Upper Hall back up and running. A huge thank you goes to all who helped with the recent clear out and who have hoovered and dusted and sorted out the kitchen. The Chapel will always be at the heart of what the Centre does and the Centre needs our help and support.

Over the coming months, our partnership of Centre and Chapel will grow and develop as we work out how to share the Upper Hall with others. There might be bumps on the road ahead, but we are moving forwards into an exciting new phase of life for both Chapel and Centre. We can begin to put the challenges behind us and look forward to a good future.

Remembering Sheila



We were all very sad to hear about the loss of our dear friend Sheila. She had been with us at Tuesday coffee the week before, and had contributed in her own inimitable way. She certainly embraced the technology that enabled us to keep connected

Sheila's family have very kindly allowed us to extract items from the Order of Service.

The service was held at Stonefall at 1pm on Thursday 27th May and was led by Rev. Trevor. We were able to join the family and close friends via Live Webcast. The service can be accessed for 28 days from Thursday. (Contact Les or Judith for details).

The entry music was a recording of *Bring Him Home*, from 'Les Miserables', by the Fron Male Voice Choir, and the closing music was the beautiful *Cavatina* by John Williams. The hymn was *Make Me A Channel of Thy Peace*. There were loving tributes from David, Siân and Sara.

The reading was the King James Version of Psalm 121, and Sheila had written the following words, read by Howard.

Mum's Own Words

I have chosen this reading because the pure air and majestic beauty of the mountain range that rose from the Dee Valley was the place to be.

I lived in Acrefair, a village taken over by Monsanto Chemical Works. At that time there was no pollution restrictions and so there was always a putrid smell of chemicals twenty four seven and as a child I wondered if it would always be like that for the rest of my life in the belief that I would never leave the village.

Remembering Sheila continued.

It was with such joy we would get on the Garth bus outside my house and be taken to the limestone crags that overlook the beautiful Valley of Dee. From the steep escarpment where the cars below looked like dinky toys we saw the Fron hills and at their base the river meandering on its way to Chester, the Shropshire Union Canal that crosses the Dee by the famous Telford's Aqueduct and two major roads linking the heart of Wales to England. We played, we rolled down the grassy slopes, we picked berries and all this breathing the fresh, so fresh air of the mountains.

I will always hold those happy times in my heart and even more so now as that is where my brother's ashes were scattered.


May has been very wet and has been competing for the wettest May on record.



Three German Towns: Osnabrück

The second of Andrew's trilogy on three German towns.



Münster, Osnabrück and Wesel print

By coincidence, Osnabrück is the feature in Musical Destinations in the May 2021 edition of BBC Music Magazine.

The opening paragraph reads Osnabrück is a small town in the heart of Lower Saxony. A gorgeous place, with half-timbered houses and cosy wine cellars, somehow off the international radar. But it has a festival that reaches out to the world – particularly to the Middle East and the musical traditions of the Arab, Persian and Turkic Worlds.

Of the three towns, this is the one I have never visited. However, long before I visited Germany for the first time in 1977, I was very familiar with the name. Some will remember a programme on BBC radio called 'Forces Favourites', when they played music requested by those stationed in mainland Europe and elsewhere. Osnabrück featured very prominently. This is not surprising, since at its height the number of British soldiers stationed in the town was about 4,000. After WW2 Britain was responsible for a substantial part of the administration of the west of Germany.

Osnabrück continued

Like Münster, Osnabrück has a long history, as the print suggests. The Diocese of Osnabrück was created by Charlemagne in 780. The town was also a member of the Hanseatic League, as were Münster and Wesel. The Hanseatic League was a trading organisation established in the Middle Ages which linked 190 towns and cities throughout Europe, including several in Britain e.g. King's Lynn and Hull. The Peace of Westphalia, which ended the Thirty Years War (1618-1648), was negotiated in Osnabrück and Münster. As a result, the town is sometimes known as the Friedensstadt 'city of peace'.

The town was extensively bombed during the war, and the Altstadt (old town) almost completely destroyed. However, as in the case of Münster, it was decided to rebuild the Altstadt in the medieval style.

Osnabrück is situated in Lower Saxony, which state or Land was created in 1946. The population of the town is now about 165,000. It has a university, which was founded in 1974. Osnabrück is twinned with Derby.

Break in Northumberland continued



This poem was written by John Donne at a time when the bubonic plague was still raging in Europe. The words are still very relevant for us today as we are still in the throes of Covid worldwide, particularly in India at this time..

In Donne's day, when someone died, the bell was rung in the village. Donne is saying in his poem that we are all part of mankind and that any person's death is a loss to all of us. Donne suggests in the last line that the bell will eventually toll for each one of us.

A part of the main.
If a clod be washed away by the sea,
Europe is the less.
As well as if a promontory were.
As well as if a manor of thine own
Or of thine friend's were.
Each man's death diminishes me,

It tolls for thee

Amen.


