FROM OUR SENIOR STEWARD

Looking forward...in Faith

I do like many of the quotes of Sir Winston Churchill, and at this time this one resonates:

'I am an optimist. It does not seem too much use being anything else'.

The past four months have had a profound effect on faith groups throughout the country, and especially in the way in which we all have been church. The Nidd Valley Circuit has been proactive and innovative, with online worship, and has been reaching an increasing number of people through daily morning prayer and weekly Sunday services. These services have been reaching more people online, than usually attend church. Long standing church activities have had to be stopped and pastoral support and ongoing communications have responded to the limitations of lockdown.

The Circuit Mission and Vision Group, 20 Plus, is now looking ahead to the future and our response to a Covid 19 affected world. As church groups, the recent lockdowns have challenged and changed our worship, church life and community. As we look forward, what have we learned, what has surprised us, what has worried us, what has saddened us and what have we rejoiced in?

The 20 Plus team is posing four questions that it feels are relevant to our future planning and would be very grateful if we would consider the following questions:

Since lockdown was imposed on our churches -

What have we found we want to keep? What have we found that we want to lose? What have we lost that we need to re find? What have we lost that needs to stay lost?

They are designed to get us just to take some time to reflect upon the changes we have all had to make due to the virus, especially around what it is for us to be part of the church. What has changed, do we want to keep these changes, do we want to get back to normal, what is normal, what could we do different if we wanted to, what should we do different?

The last 4 months have been so different and our staff and circuit stewards need help from us all, as consideration is given to opening our doors again, whenever that may be.

We had a very interesting time at a recent Zoom meeting and it is hoped that this was in some small way helpful.

TRIBUTE TO MARGARET CLELAND SMITH 30 MARCH 1946 - 7 JUNE 2020

It was with sadness that we heard of the death of our friend Margaret during the lockdown, specially as we could not pay our respects at her funeral. Margaret's niece Ann has sent us this tribute to Margaret, much of which is from the funeral service.

Margaret had been struggling increasingly with her mobility and communication skills over the last couple of years. She had a very serious road accident at the end of January this year. During her time in hospital following the accident, a number of underlying health issues were found. Due to her frailty these could not be investigated further at the time. Following a period in ICU and several ward and hospital transfers, Margaret was undergoing rehabilitation at Trinity Ward, Ripon Hospital when the government insisted, via the Covid 19 Act, that all patients in hospitals be transferred immediately to their homes or out to other settings. This led to her being transferred at short notice to Boroughbridge Manor Care home. Despite the best efforts of staff there, Margaret's health declined rapidly and significantly and she then contracted Covid 19. Sadly this appears to have been one battle too many for her already frail body and she passed away peacefully on Sunday 7 June..

Margaret's life was truly panoramic in its breadth and scope. Her biological family is modest in number but she acquired a wider extended family through her marriage to husband Leslie in 1981. She also developed a huge network of close friends over many years through her work and her pursuit of a wide variety of hobbies and interests.

The second of two children, Margaret was born to Nan and Jack Marr in Garrowhill, Glasgow in 1946. Her older sister Betty was 13 when she was born. Her father began his working life as a postman in Coylton area, Ayrshire - her mother was the daughter of a dairy farmer there. Jack and Nan had an active Christian faith and, following her birth, Margaret was baptised in the local Church of Scotland near her home in Glasgow.

Margaret inherited a great deal from her father - her red hair, her love of steamers (in particular the Waverley), her love of stamps, postcards, trains and, not least, her musical ability both on various instruments and in her singing. Jack, her father, sang and conducted choirs both secular and in church. Most notably he conducted an army choir in Bethlehem on Christmas Day 1940 as part of 'Hearing from the Frontline' programme broadcast by the BBC on Christmas afternoon. He played banjo in a dance band for a time in Portsmouth. He also played piano and ensured that both Betty and Margaret learned the instrument although, ultimately, it was Margaret that had the talent to make this her career.

In 1950 the family moved to Portsmouth. Margaret attended primary school and secondary school there. As part of her 70th birthday celebrations in 2016 the family took Margaret to Portsmouth to see her old house in Mayles Road and her old primary school building. She pointed out the house where her piano teacher had lived and shared happy memories of that time. Margaret inherited Jack's piano following his death at the age of 79 in 1983. She often said that she and her husband Leslie bought their house in Dragon Avenue, Harrogate, as it had a room that would suit the piano she loved.

Following another family move to Finchley, London, on leaving school, Margaret commenced studies at Royal Academy of Music (RAM) which she completed in 1967. After taking her Diploma of Education in Reading University, Margaret initially taught in Bath but moved to Harrogate Ladies College (HLC) in the early 1970s in order to be nearer her parents who had retired to Dunoon, Argyll in Scotland.

Margaret made friends at the RAM and stayed in touch with three of them for over 50 years. They and their husbands used to meet up every 5 years or so in various parts of the country. Jenny Doolan, one of these RAM friends remembers these get-togethers with fondness and reports 'Our best and favorite venue was when Leslie and Margaret arranged a special journey on N. Yorkshire Railway. It was a magical weekend. Another memory to treasure - during her time with me on a Welsh holiday she came along to a concert I was giving (with 3 other Harpists) - she just happened to have her recorder with her and was able to join in our repertoire, she was such a good musician.'

Tribute to Margaret Smith continued.. At HLC, Margaret really found her niche and made lifelong friends with people both from the teaching staff there and through Harrogate Choral Society. It was at the Choral Society she met the love of her life, husband Leslie, and they married in July 1981, enjoying more than thirty years of marriage until his untimely death in 2012.

Margaret pursued any activity she took up with unstinting loyalty and dedication. She volunteered at the North Yorkshire Moors Railway for over 30 years, helping in the shop initially I think, then becoming a station foreman and clerk in the booking office at Goathland Station. In later years, Margaret also volunteered at the National Railway museum with their Inreach Team for 10 years, attending the 10th anniversary celebratory dinner for volunteers just prior to her car accident at the end of January. During the 10 years, this small team responded to over 500 enquiries from people who were unable to attend the museum to search the archives for themselves, and raised over £10,000 in funds for the museum.

Music, though, was Margaret's first love and she belonged to several choral societies and choirs over the years including Harrogate, Ripon and Wetherby Choral Societies, a recorder ensemble, and Ashville singers to name but a few. She is said to have rarely missed a rehearsal, attending in all weathers. She is reported to have sung in well over 50 Carol Services at Holy Trinity Church, Wesley Chapel and Ripon Cathedral. With her sense of perfect pitch there was apparently a gentle jostling amongst less experienced staff and pupils to ensure that they positioned themselves near her to help keep in tune, especially with some of the 20th Century repertoire. She often sang at least 3 Handel's Messiah's per year with undaunted enthusiasm.

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Tribute to Margaret Smith continued. Although Margaret and Leslie made a conscious choice from the outset not to have children of their own, they had a surprising number of children that grew up knowing her in their respective families and in the families of their friends. Margaret has nearly always taken an interest in and followed the lives of all the children in both her sister Betty's and in Leslie's family. She is godmother to at least one of her friends children. All this in addition to teaching clarinet or piano to the children of friends, private pupils and, of course her students during over 30 years at HLC. She mentored at least one young volunteer at the NYMR who remembers her with fondness, saying she was very tolerant. A lot of people will know tolerance was not always the word that sprang to mind as her over-riding virtue She could speak her mind forthrightly and one would always know that was the end of the matter! However, this was easy to overlook as she was unfailingly loyal and dedicated in all that she did and was also very kind and appreciative.

The family have expressed their gratitude for all the help and kindness shown to Margaret by her friends and church 'family' at Wesley over the years.


