MINISTER'S LETTER

May I wish you 'a belated Happy Christmas and a peaceful New Year'

Somewhere in our house there is a wooden box which is probably older than me. It proudly proclaims on its lid that it was constructed to contain Hudson's Soap. At this time I have no memory of Hudson's soap. (Other soaps are available).

The box is probably, and here I am relying on my memory, about 18" by 9" and about 6" deep. The lid is just a piece of timber which fits into the groove on the top. The last time I saw the box it was tied up with string in the way that my father used to tie things up. It contains the glass ornaments which was used, year by year to decorate our artificial Christmas Tree. The same tree we had for years.

For many years it was the privilege of my older brother to wait until I had gone to bed and erect the tree and decorate it and I saw it the next day in all its brilliance and splendour adorned with those glass ornaments and coloured electric lights.

Of course in the manner of these things, before or on twelfth night the tree was stripped of lights and baubles, had its branches carefully folded in and was replaced in its box and the baubles wrapped in tissue paper and Christmas was put away for another year . When my brother left home I moved up the scale and had the privilege of taking his place in decorating the tree with its lights and baubles.

I wonder if you also have similar memories. If you have, no doubt you will tell them and for my part I will look round the see if I can locate the Hudson's soap box. (I hope I can find it to authenticate my story!!!)

But I have been thinking this year about the whole issue of 'putting Christmas away in a box'

This year my father is 116 years old. Well he would be if he were still alive. In the celebration of Christmas I do not recall anybody wishing Jesus happy 2020th Birthday. (There is question about the actual year of Jesus' birth but we will gloss over that.)

Of course our belief is, that although the physical Jesus is no longer living he is still living in a significant way and, as the hymn says 'He lives today in Bread and Wine.'

It is enough for so many to think every year about the same couple who made a tortuous journey from their home village to Bethlehem where they could not find a place to stay until the same innkeeper offered them the same stable. They had the same baby and were astounded to receive the same visitors from the locality and from a afar. And it all happened on one night. Shut the book. Amen.

We need to help people to recognise that far from being the end of the story that was the beginning and what we celebrate is not the story of an event but a recalling of an actual event which made a difference to the world.

In real terms, as I have said before, we have not reached the end of the first part of the story because at an appropriate period of time after the birth., ie after forty days which is actually on February 2nd (Candlemas) the baby was presented to God in the Temple and Mary continued to ponder in her heart the significance of the event which had taken place when Jesus was born.

May we continue to ponder and remind the world what God has done and remember that Jesus continues to come to us in many and varied ways, if we allow him so to do.

CIRCUIT STAFFING

Most of you will be aware that Rev. Ann Fox is moving this summer to the Tadcaster Circuit and will be based in Wetherby as Superintendent.

Following discussions with our District Chair, Rev. Leslie Newton, it has been agreed that Ann will be leaving the Nidd Valley Circuit in May, a little earlier than anticipated. The reason for this is that Tadcaster has been without a full-time Superintendent since September 2018 and is now being cared for on a part-time basis by Rev. Ruth Parry.

Ann's farewell service will be on the evening of 3rd May at Starbeck. Nidd Valley Circuit will be supported by the District team from then until Rev. Lesley Taylor joins us in September. Meanwhile the Circuit team will be working on the reorganisation as agreed by the September Circuit Meeting and will seek District support, from May, for Bilton Area, Starbeck and Wesley. Please do pray for Ann and the circuit team as they work out the ramifications of this earlier change.

Cover Picture

The Matterhorn is one of the highest summits in the Alps and Europe and is on the border between Switzerland and Italy. The mountain overlooks the Swiss town of Zermatt and Italian town of Breuil-Cervinia. It remained unclimbed until 1865 when a party led by a British man, Edward Whymper, made it to the summit. Four of its seven members fell to their deaths on the descent. This iconic mountain has been an inspiration for artists, writers and film-makers and of course photographers.

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BOOK CLUB REVIEW

The Mayor of Casterbridge by Thomas Hardy. We discussed this classic novel having been fuelled by an excellent buffet lunch, as this was our 'Christmas meeting'. All except one had enjoyed the book and pronounced it a page-turner and a jolly good story.

Hardy's life covered most of Victoria's reign, that of Edward VII and most of the reign of George V. He married his first wife Emma in 1874. She died suddenly in 1912 and he was stricken with remorse for his neglect of her after their differences in her latter years. He wrote many poems in memory of her and their happiness together in their early years. His output of poetry was in fact more prolific than his novels. He married again in 1914 and died in 1928.

The novel portrays Hardy's view of life. It is set in a rural agricultural town and addresses several issues including the economic gap between farmers and business men on one side and ill-paid labourers on the other; the impact of new machinery and the prejudices and lingering superstitions of some locals and the survival of illegal practises such as wife-selling and mock parades. It also relates to pre-historic and Roman times. One of the scenes is set around a royal visit to the town.

Michael Henchard is the central character. In a drunken state he sold his wife for five guineas, and after a long period of regret and hard work became Mayor of Casterbridge. His eventual downfall from this privileged position was due to his own passionate and fiery temperament and strong character. Most of us, were saddened by his apparent intent on self-destruction, and had willed him mend his ways and become successful again.

The story benefits from originally being serialised, and the end of some chapters left the reader in suspense and on a cliff edge. The novel is written in a clear and dramatic way. Henchard's tragic end is beautifully and sensitively told.

If you haven't read it, then I recommend you do so for the pure pleasure of an exciting story and one of the greatest pieces of writing of its time.
