# WESLEY FELLOWSHIP





At our September meeting Andrew gave us a fascinating talk entitled *Harrogate's Forgotten Composer* about Ernest Bristow Farrar (7 July 1885 – 18 September 1918). Although he was not born in Harrogate, Farrar spent much of his life in the north of England. He was educated at Leeds Grammar School where he began organ studies. He eventually won a scholarship to study at the Royal College of Music where he studied with Sir Charles Villiers Stanford and was a friend of English composer, violist and conductor Frank Bridge. For a time he was organist at Christ Church in Harrogate. He is

best-known today as a teacher of Gerald Finzi. However, he himself wrote a large number of works for orchestra, voices and organ. Andrew played us a small sample of Farrar's music and we were impressed by the variety of his output and the complexity of some of his pieces.

Farrar's career was cut short by the World War 1. He enlisted in the Grenadier Guards in 1915 and joined the regiment in August 1916. He was then commissioned as Second Lieutenant in the 3rd Battalion Devonshire Regiment. He was killed in the Somme in 1918 after being at the front for two days. His grave lies just outside the churchyard wall in Ronssoy Communal Cemetery.



Gerald Finzi, was deeply affected by Farrar's death. Frank Bridge was also deeply affected, and dedicated his Piano Sonata to the memory of Farrar. Farrar's widow Olive continued to live in Hollins Road, Harrogate. She died in 1979.

Quote from a letter from Ralph Vaughan Williams on Farrar;s appointment as organist at St. Hilda's Church, South Shields: 'I suppose I must congratulate you on your appointment – I certainly congratulate them – but it's a beastly job being organist and unless one is very careful lowers one's moral tone (not to speak of one's musical) horribly.

Stanford wrote in the *Durham University Journal:* 'Farrar was one of my most loyal and devoted pupils. He was very shy, but full of poetry, and I always thought very high things of him as a composer, and lamented his loss both personally and artistically'.



# MESSAGE FROM OUR MINISTER

Dear Friends,

It is wonderful to be the minister of Wesley Chapel. For a number of years I have felt a connection to the community, as my great uncle (Doug Hay) was a member of the chapel.

It was equally wonderful to preach my first service, as your new minister, on 17th September. I thank you for your warm welcome.

In this last month I have been pondering about entitlement. We have celebrated harvest and have given thanks for the abundance of food. For the Psalmist declares, 'You care for the land and water it; you enrich it abundantly' (Psalm 65:9).

At times, it is easy to feel an entitlement to the abundance of food. We click on our online grocery shop, open the food cupboard doors and see the food waste in our bins.

Yet there are many people around the world and living in Harrogate who do not experience an abundance of food. Climate change, famine, war, inequality of wealth and unjust distribution of technological resources leaves people hungry.

I remember last Christmas an article in the Stray Ferret. The person wrote 'It surprised a lot of people we went to Resurrected Bites. On the outside, I had got a fairly good job, but all of a sudden we were hundreds of pounds down a month. We were at the point of incurring a lot of debt and struggling to fill our bellies.'

Our life circumstances can rapidly change that removes the illusion of entitlement. God has blessed our world with an abundance of food but those who have must think with grateful and humble hearts how we can all share God's gift.

- Two new Circuit Stewards, Graham Taylor (Gracious Street, and David Woodward (Harlow Hill).were welcomed.
- There have been no volunteers to take on the role of Circuit Safeguarding Officer. Ron Hicks has agreed to hold the fort for one more year. This role is a vital function of circuit life and one which needs to be filled.
- Synod Reps are: Sharon Wright, Ed Walton, Mark Wheatley, Les Sudron, Judith Yeats.
- Elliot Crippen (Starbeck), who is the District Communications Enabler gave an interesting presentation about a podcast that he and his wife have developed in conjunction with Methodist Church Kairos Movement, entitled *Don't Wake the Baby'*, which is aimed at connecting parents. Circuit Meeting Notes continued.

- **Moses replacement.** The decision has been made by the Circuit Invitation Committee (CIC) to go into stationing for a probationer, to replace Moses. We will know by the beginning of October whether or not we are 'in the reckoning'. If successful there will be a match at the beginning of January.
- **26 Woodlands Drive.** The manse needs at lot of work including a new roof. It has an uneconomical EPC which is not up to the standard expected for a manse. Therefore permission was granted to the Circuit Leadership Team to sell Woodlands Drive and buy new.a Manse, which needs to be r eady by April. The new house will be situated on one of the new housing developments, eg. Bluecoat Wood (near Horticap.)

**Staffing.** There have not been any suitable applicants for the position of Local Pastor at Gracious Street.


- **Vision & Strategy** Deacon Gary Hoare's support group has met and work has begun on the way forward for Gary's mission, in particular with new housing developments.
- **2026** will be a key year in the circuit: If we get a probationer it will be the year they are ordained; subject to Lesley's reinvitation she will sit down in that year; the gap is getting bigger between the availability of presbyters and requirements and there is no guarantee that Lesley would be replaced; it will be the end of Ron (Killinghall) and Diane (Park Grove) Hicks's three years. Churches are asked to consider what it will mean for them, and to pray for the future life of the circuit.
- It will be Scotton's 200th birthday. Woodlands will be 60 next year.
- **Circuit Youth.** Lesley is gathering information about the youth in the circuit and has asked that where there are young people aged 11 plus in the churches to let her know.
- **Local Preachers Report.** Kim John and Kath Jones are 'on trial' and are both well on the way to becoming accredited local preachers.
- **Finance.** There is a £38k surplus, mainly because of a delay in appointing the Wesley Centre Manager, and Gracious Street Pastor. However, big expenditure on properties is expected.
- **Connexional Funds.** Giving to this fund has gone down and churches are asked to put this on their church councils' agenda.

Circuit Meeting Notes continued.

- **Property.** Following the recent safety issues regarding potentially dangerous concrete, the Methodist Property Deparment will be sending out information, particularly for those churches that were built or modified between 1960s and 90s.
- **Next steps for the circuit.** In order to be proactive, an Away Day is being planned to enable discussion on how to take the circuit forward. It will be at a venue outside the circuit. Watch out for details later this quarter.
- John Batchelor Award. This was given to Lucy Morris from Trinity who received £50 for her exceptional contributions to her church. The process for 2024 has begun. Nominations forms are available from Ben, or Mary Briggs-Dennison at Trinity, for nominations for pupils in years 7-11 (1-5 at senor school).
- Ben's Sabbatical. Lesley will chair the June Circuit Meeting.
- **Methodist Conference 2024** is in Leeds and anyone can be a visitor at the Open session.
- **Dates of future meetings.** 21 March 2024, 7.30pm at Trinity. 18 June 2024, 7.30pm at tbc (FORUM)

# PHOTOGRAPHS OF THE MONTH





#### SELECTED NOTES FROM WESLEY CENTRE MANAGEMENT TEAM MEETING HELD 11 SEPTEMBER.

- **Repairs and installations.** A Government grant has been applied for to restore broken railings, to install gates on the steps and the ramp and for the installation of more cameras round the building. The broken windows will be repaired.
- New stair-treads are on order for the stairs leading up to the gallery.
- **Cleaning Contract**. A new cleaner, from the same company, has started and is doing a good job. A deep clean took place before the MHA Anniversary Service.
- Debris outside the church. Despite continued support from HHP there is still much debris outside on a daily basis. Some is due to McDonald's, who are being asked to come across and tidy up..
- **Roof repairs Jinnahs and HIF.** The roof on this building requires attention and damage to the timbers is worse than first thought. The dormer windows at the back of Jinnahs are faulty. Quotes have been requested for carrying out this work, and for the scaffolding that will be required.
- **Finance.** There is a deficit of £17-18k. Maintenance is the big item. However, there will be no circuit assessment next year and rentals and bookings are up, so the situation is not quite as bad as it seems.
- **Speakers.** These need to be replaced. The speakers we have at the present time are on loan. New speakers will cost in the region of £1,150 each.
- **Meeting with HHP.** Ben, Les and Ed continue to have regular meetings with the CEO and Chair of HHP.
- **Ben's sabbatical.** Ben will be on sabbatical in June, July and August next year. During this time Gordon will chair the Wesley Centre Trustees meeting and someone (yet to be nominated) will chair the Management Team.
