MINISTER'S LETTER

Dear friends

'He leads me beside still waters'" Psalm 23:2b

In case you haven't heard, the Clowes family have grown in number! No we haven't had any more children but we do now have a puppy, Russ. He's a Coton de Tulear and whilst the family do love him, he can be very naughty indeed! As Catherine has been off her feet with a bad knee I've been doing lots of the walking and it led me reflect on the similarities of our walk with Christ.

Dogs like a good walk - already Russ gets excited when we go and get the lead. Let's be honest we do like it when God turns up and we go walking with him. Every year, Catherine and I go to ECG in Scarborough (the successor to Easter People) and we come away refreshed, with the wind in our sails, ready to walk wherever God leads.

Dogs also like to stop and sniff. Many of the walk routes I do with Russ I could probably do in half the time if I didn't have a dog with me. I can be walking along feeling the extendable lead stretching out behind me as I leave Russ behind. There's something of our walk with God in this too. Think about the things that distract us on our walk, the moments when we get stuck and we stop noticing that God is walking on ahead.

Dogs also like to run on ahead. There are also those moments when I'm telling Russ to slow down. If the wind is up and it catches his fur he can set off dashing and nearly pulls my arm out of its socket! We can be like this too with God. We feel we have set off in the direction he's leading and we go rushing ahead and sometimes we need the sharp tug from God to remind us to let him lead.

When we've been to training with Russ one of the activities has been getting him to walk beside us. He's not the best at it yet but he is only 6 months old. As Christians we need to learn to walk beside God. Psalm 23 reminds us that "he leads us beside the still waters" and through the darkest valleys of life.

As we prepare once again for Lent, a time to stop and reflect where we are on our walk with God, maybe it's time to put our 20/20 specs on and see if we're ready to walk, whether we've got stuck behind or are running on ahead. Let's pause and reflect and allow him to lead us as we journey on our walk of faith with him. Yours in Christ.. **Ben**

When her friend had left the lady was made a cup of tea by her husband with his forlorn question 'can I get you something to eat...?' Her totally unexpected response was 'yes please, I think I would like a cheese scone'

A small step forward...

It was many years later that the friend was told about this totally forgotten moment.

As William Wordsworth wrote in Tintern Abbey:

'The best part of a good person's life.

The little, nameless, unremembered acts of kindness and love.'

Have you or do you know someone who has a little 'cheese scone' story that transforms God's love from words into reality: loving people into the Kingdom?

IN MEMORY

One of Wesley's longest-standing members Nancy Stuart, born in 1927, sadly passed away on Friday 14 February aged 92. She contributed so much to the life of Wesley over many years and in many different ways.

She was always concerned for the welfare of others, not only within Wesley but also the wider community. Together with Rev. Gordon Lister and Mr Doug Baker, she was instrumental in sowing the seeds for what became the Harrogate Homeless Project, as they were so worried about the number of people sleeping rough.

Nancy's biggest sadness in her life was losing her daughter Jane, at the age of 21. In memory of Jane, Nancy gave the bench which was outside the front of the church for many years. The bench was often frequented, and sometimes not so well treated, by those whom Nancy had wanted to help. But, despite offers to remove it to protect Jane's memory, Nancy always declined and said it should be used by whoever needed it.

She also took her turn on the rotas for various Wesley activities, in particular Forward Together, in which she was active for many years. She was always ready to help others and visit those who were bed/hospital-bound. However, she didn't like any fuss for herself and was never backward in coming forward to say so! So she had to be firmly reminded on more than one occasion that people must be allowed to reciprocate the care and kindness that she had shown others.

A staunch advocate of furthering the advancement of medicine, Nancy wanted neither burial nor cremation, instead wishing for an alternative which she has been granted: her body has been accepted for donation for medical research and education.

On a personal note, Jane was my oldest childhood friend and Nancy was a constant reminder of happy memories of my time around Jane. Nancy leaves another daughter Helen, son James, and two grandchildren.

God bless you Nancy, may you rest in peace and finally be reunited with your dear beloved Jane x

BOOK CLUB REVIEW

Suffragettes – (the fight for votes for women)

(edited by Joyce Marlow)

"Promise me you will always use your vote", my mother said. 'Too many women suffered too much for you to waste it'. It's not a promise many mothers would ask of their daughters today, but that was in 1951 and aged twenty-one I was newly eligible to vote. (Jovce Marlow)

This is a book full of personal accounts, letters written and newspaper articles. Outlining events from 1832 when the first women's suffrage petition was presented to the House of Commons through to 1928 when women were entitled to vote in the same way as men.

I wonder, Mr Editor, Why I can't have the vote: And I will not be contented Till I've found the reason out. I am a working woman. My voting half is dead. I hold a house, and want to know Why I can't vote instead. I pay my rates in person, Under protest tho', 'tis true: But I pay them, and am qualified To vote as well as vou.

(Sarah Ann Jackson – letter published in Leeds Express 4 March 1868)

Interestingly, the book states that the focus of the movement was not wholly and solely on getting the vote! For most activists the vote was the first essential step on the hard, high road towards greater sexual equality. Many of them worked for causes and reforms outside the suffrage arena. The National Union of Women's Suffrage Societies' newspaper, Common Cause, produced articles on: Massacre of the Innocents - Mortality rates in Workhouses; Anti- Sweating Bill; Child Murder: Partition of Bengal: State Registration of Nurses: Payment of MPs; Nameless Cruelties to Pit Ponies; Free Libraries; Public Nurseries; National Equine Defence League. The vote was the means, not the end... Continued p18 Suffragettes continued.

Militancy only stated in 1904. In 1906 the Daily Mail coined the word "suffragette" to differentiate the old style "patiently and persevering" from the new style of "deeds not words". Suffragette denoted any women campaigning for the vote with a suffragist being the most violent militant – but the words were often interchangeable.

Both groups claimed that it was their actions that gained women the vote in 1928.

There were also a number of anti-suffrage movements.

'The Queen is most anxious to enlist everyone who can speak or write to join in checking this mad wicked folly of "Woman's Rights", with all its attendant horrors on which her poor sex is bent'. (Queen Victoria 1870)

It was grueling to read of the imprisonments of both women and men and the horrific conditions surrounding force feeding. The 'cat and mouse' clause allowed for women to be released if they became ill while refusing food but then re-imprisoned when their health improved outside of jail.

During our discussions members of the Book Club reflected for a while on the question – 'what would you do ...for your rights?'.

In summary comments from the group included:

'a book for the book shelf'

'interesting'

'did us good to read it'

'liked the chronology of the pieces and articles'

The book certainly introduced us to many ordinary women who had the courage to stand up and be counted, no matter the consequences.

TREASURERS REPORT

The provisional accounts reported at the October meeting have now been audited and there are no changes. They show a deficit over the year of nearly £2000. We are still more than viable because at the time the Chapel became separate from the Centre we had a cushion of £10,000. However we have no income other than collections and Forward Together, both of which are reducing.

Organ repairs may prove expensive and the PA system needs attention (both of which are used mostly by us rather than other groups). Although we no longer have responsibility for the upkeep of the building, we make a contribution to the Circuit of £5500. We had talked at the last meeting about a Gift Day, but no further action so far. These matters will be discussed by the stewards.

It is hoped there will be a Christmas Coffee morning in aid of church funds on either 14 or 21 November depending on when the Harrogate Christmas Market will be, as this brings in extra visitors.
