COVER PICTURE

Farm Garden with Crucifix by Gustav Klimt.

Gustav Klimt (July 14, 1862 – February 6, 1918) was an Austrian painter best known for his erotic paintings of women, which were influenced by Japanese art and its methods.

Klimt painted several cottage styled pieces that illustrate the countryside. This was a departure from his usual art nouveau, and is more of an impressionist style, highlighting the beauty of nature. The painting illustrates a calm garden that transcends into a forest, and includes a pole with a crucifix of Jesus Christ and a miniature statue of mother Mary. The crucifix, and Mother Mary statute are covered in an array of bright flowers that seem to grow on the pole covered in vegetation. Shades of yellow pop out near the top of the structure, with different coloured flowers near the bottom. A common characteristic of the artist's flowers in all paintings was that they always carried a yellow centre in the middle.

The remainder of the canvas is painted with classic shades of green to illustrate the vegetation of the Austrian landscape and leads to a forest, portraying the birch trees that were prevalent in the countryside where he lived.

It was at the end of his career that Klimt began exploring the concept of religion within his art, perhaps due to the abrupt death of his father and brother. The work was painted just before the First World War, when tensions were mounting in the region. The empire of Austria was weakening and the aggression in the Balkans was strengthening. The small simple crucifix, lonely and isolated in Klimt's beloved countryside haven, possibly appealed to him as a beacon of hope.

The painting was destroyed by a fire caused by German armed forces in Austria during World War Two.

METHODIST CHURCH REACTS TO NO DEAL BREXIT

An open letter to the new Prime Minister from leaders of 7 Christian denominations, including The Methodist Church, expresses concern that failing to agree a deal on Brexit will 'hit those held back by poverty very hard indeed'. The Church leaders say they have been 'compelled' to write to the new Prime Minister because of his position that leaving the European Union without a deal is acceptable. The letter warns that, in the event that a deal is not reached, 'In essence, the Government will be relying on the hope that our former EU partners are willing to co-operate even without an agreement – a huge gamble to take with the basic needs of our poorest citizens and communities.'

HARROGATE WELCOMES THE WORLD

UCI World Road Cycling Championships. From 21 to 29 September 2019 our Circuit will be the focus of the 'World Cup of Cycling' - the UCI World Road Cycling Championships.

As you have read previously, Wesley is being hired by the UCI organising committee to be its Volunteer Hub so will be closed for 2.5 weeks to anyone who doesn't have security clearance to enter the building. The Circuit Staff Team will be offering a Chaplaincy support there so its members will be going through the security clearance procedures.

Harlow Hill and Trinity are affected every day by the racing and will need circuit support (alongside support of the other 9 churches which are affected at least once - the only churches not directly on the route of a race are Park Grove, Kearby and Kirk Hammerton).

There will be no business meetings during the Championships in any church in the circuit. Consequently everyone is encouraged to put aside other activities for these 9 days and support the mission work in the circuit. Forms went out recently asking every person in every church **What can you do to help!** Ways in which you can help are:

- Setting up (opens at 8.30am)
- Catering
- Clearing tables and chatting
- Chatting to visitors inside
- Welcoming visitors outside
- Cashiers
- Praying with visitors

If you will not be in Harrogate during the Championships you can help by baking cakes (Trinity has a large freezer) or delivering leaflets to local hotels and establishments, before the event. If you have not filled in a form and would like to offer help please contact Judith Yeats

DID YOU KNOW?

LIFELINE

Most of us are aware that one of our offices in the Lower Hall is rented out to a company called Lifeline. This organisation does an amazing job of finding people homes, and you can read more about its work if you visit its excellent website <https://lifelineharrogate.co.uk>. The work of Lifeline is to purchase and renovate housing to enable the homeless to have a route out of the Harrogate Homeless Project, and to be able to live independently, but with support. The first house was completed in January 2013.

Since then the following successes have been achieved:

- 16,400 nights of accommodation to 53 men since Feb 2013
- 26 men have had a successful move-on from us
- 60% of residents have found paid-employment whilst with us
- 73% have actively engaged with their support plan
- 70% have engaged in some meaningful activity
- 10 men have recovered from addiction
- Average stay with Lifeline is 310 nights
- 2 men's lives were saved by our interventions

We are delighted that Lifeline works from our premises, and congratulate it on its wonderful achievement.

FAMOUS CHRISTIANS

First meal on the moon: how Buzz Aldrin took communion (and why NASA hushed it up). Almost everyone knows Neil Armstrong and Buzz Aldrin were the first people to stand on the moon. Almost everyone knows what Armstrong said: 'That's one small step for man, one giant leap for mankind.' But how many know what Buzz Aldrin did before they stepped out on to the moon's surface?

Aldrin was a convinced Christian and an elder at Webster Presbyterian Church, Houston, Texas. Before the flight he had wondered about how to mark the landing. He wrote in an article for Guideposts magazine in 1970 that his pastor Dean Woodruff had told him 'God reveals himself in the common elements of everyday life' – like bread and wine. Woodruff gave him a silver chalice to take with him on the flight, and there was just enough gravity for him to be able to pour the wine from a plastic container.

He wrote in Guideposts: 'In the one-sixth gravity of the moon the wine curled slowly and gracefully up the side of the cup. It was interesting to think that the very first liquid ever poured on the moon, and the first food eaten there, were communion elements.' He also read from John 15.5: 'I am the vine, you are the branches. Whoever remains in me, and I in him, will bear much fruit, for you can do nothing without me.'

Before he took communion, he radioed back to NASA: 'I would like to request a few moments of silence. I would like to invite each person listening in, wherever and whomever he may be, to contemplate for a moment the events of the past few hours and to give thanks in his own individual way.' NASA kept quiet about what he was actually doing, though. It was bruised by the activities of atheist campaigner Madalyn Murray O'Hair, who had fought a series of court battles – all of which she lost – against it because the crew of a previous mission, Apollo 8, had read out the creation story from Genesis during their orbit. She thought it violated the constitutional division between church and state.

The Bible and the moon have a lot more history besides all that, though. Three hundred microfilmed King James Versions were carried on the Apollo 14 mission at the instigation of the Apollo Prayer League, 100 of which went down to the moon in the lunar module with astronaut Edgar Mitchell

There's also a paper Bible still on the moon; it's on the dashboard of an abandoned lunar rover and was left there by Apollo 15 astronaut David Scott. **Author: Mark Woods, 20 July 2019. Extracted from the Bible Society Newsletter.**



Two amazing athletes and Christians.

Did you watch the Cricket World Cup Final between England and New Zealand. Or did you watch the Wimbledon Men's Single Final. Sadly they were both on at the same time, and they were both nail-biting finals. My granddaughter was watching the cricket and was hiding behind the settee, she couldn't bear to watch.

However, like many of you, I watched the Mens Wimbledon final between Novak Djokovic and Roger Federer. I found this message on Facebook by Scott Brennan, a pastor at the Lighthouse Church who said he 'was amazed at (the players) athleticism and determination (and) decided to research both Djokovic and Federer to find out what drives a person to be so focused. He was pleasantly surprised to discover they are both Christians. Djokovic is Orthodox Christian and Federer is a Roman Catholic.

Both men have been incredibly generous financially in helping the poor and setting up charitable foundations to help disadvantaged people. They both have said that their fame and wealth should be used for common good rather than selfishly and that their faith is a key part of who they are, motivating them to be the person they are. I am encouraged by this, because Christianity in the west is often seen as a spent force when in fact it is motivating some of our top athletes and helping them choose to be ambassadors for good causes.'
