## MINISTER'S LETTER

This will be my last Minister's letter!! I look back at my journal on the days when I first arrived, with both an excitement and trepidation for what was ahead in Circuit life. I remember being sat on the bench in the High Street opposite Starbeck Methodist Church, watching everyone leaving Sunday morning worship (I had been at St Andrew's), wondering how I would fit in (the churches within 'my section', and the community) and what it would be like to be 'their minister'.

Now, nearly four years later, I feel torn at leaving here. I've felt very much a part of church life, in all of the churches I am involved in, and in the wider Circuit.

I would like to take the opportunity to thank you all so much for your wonderful support, fellowship, and friendship, throughout my probation and 'beyond'. Thank you for welcoming me into the Wesley Chapel and Centre family.

I'm a believer in life-long learning and that you don't learn something properly until you are 'in the role'. And I think we have learned a lot together, about our discipleship, our relationships with God and each other, and also among our ecumenical partners and local community.

*But I haven't left yet – and there is much that I still want to share with you.....*

I want to encourage you in your worship. Continue to try different styles and music, encourage other peoples' gifts and talents, respect other people's ideas and tastes (especially when they do not match your own). Continue to share your stories and carry on the 'Our Calling' theme upon which all we do is built.

We all need to remember that our worship doesn't end at the door of the church on a Sunday but continues as we leave it. God is out in the world and asks us to join him in his mission. I'm excited for you at the prospect of a Town Centre Chaplaincy and pray that we receive the funding!

Dear Rowland and Ethel,

I think it is my duty just to write a few lines which you may read at your leisure. Now that you are married you will be called upon to share the joys and sorrows of life. I have no need to tell you Rowland that patience is the parent of politeness. As every husband should make a study of patience, which is first of all the matrimonial virtues. Although you are married, never forget the heart (?art) of courting. Because love is mans pastime and a womans business and no lover should leave himself bankrupt of kisses, which are the best complexion restorer in the world. You may pride yourself upon being sensible, Rowland, and yet overlook the fact that a woman is never too old to be kissed. And let me advise you never to ask your wifes advice unless you mean to take it. Then always take her first judgements, not her second, for in the first thoughts of a woman and the second thoughts of a man, you have all the wisdom in the world.

## IN MEMORY OF KEN



Kenneth Albert Selkirk was born on 7 October 1928 at Seven Kings, Ilford, Essex, in the East End of Greater London. He was the tenth child of Victorian parents, the family spanning 23 years meant half were married when he arrived.

Born into the Great Depression, times were hard. His father's business in the city collapsed and the family downsized from a large double-fronted property to a terrace house. 'Waste not want not' and the work ethic

were the rules of the time, and in retrospect Ken was pleased that he got every position he applied for during his life - plus the last one, which he didn't apply for but dropped into his lap—Wesley Treasurer!

When the war came Ken and his sister Joy were evacuated first to Ipswich until invasion threatened, then to South Wales. Policy at the time was for siblings not to be billeted together, so Ken only saw Joy occasionally. This confusing and lonely time continued until Ken was brought home in 1942, although he was not allowed to start work in this critical time in the war until he reached the age of 14 in the autumn.

Feeling very grown up and useful as an apprentice instrument maker in a war factory, he enjoyed metal work and making naval instruments. Watching air raids and doodlebugs and expecting V2 rockets made for a very exciting life. At this time Ken became a very keen Army Cadet and in 3 years became a Sergeant Major. He was not old enough to join the army until early 1946, just after the war ended. A recruiting officer told him he was 'too tall' to join the Tank Regiment so he completed Infantry training in Belfast. Then somehow, as an Officer Cadet, his original request was unearthed and, miraculously, in December 1947 he was commissioned into the Royal Tank Regiment by Field Marshall Montgomery, on the same day as Monty's son.

After 5 years he made the move from instructing tank-driving and running a driver-training school to the Royal Army Service Corp-continuing his career in transport. Forming a coronation transport company, in 1952, Ken lived in a tent beside the zoo in Regent's Park. The highlight was leading a column of lorries around Buckingham Palace on Coronation morning. He got tremendous cheers all the way.

After 3 years in Egypt and Malta as Adjutant in headquarters, the tour ended with the hectic period of the Malta-Suez emergency. Here he experienced his only parade ground embarrassment, trying to drill a few reluctant National Service men around the vast Floriana parade ground. Back in the UK Ken joined the strategic reserve, just in time for an exciting first, moving a transport company to Cyprus, welded to the flight deck of an aircraft carrier.

After this last tour Ken was posted to be Staff Captain at headquarters, Rhine Army in Germany where he met his dear wife Ann, who was a British Families Education Service teacher. They got to know each other through their involvement in their local Gilbert & Sullivan Society. Their love of music and dance was a bond they enjoyed throughout their life together.

Married in Rheindahlen, they returned to the UK in 1962 when their first daughter Elizabeth was born. After training in the Territorial Army in Manchester the family returned to Germany and the Royal Corps of Transportation.

The high point of Ken's career in the army was acting as Supply Liaison under the command of Major General Fitzallan-Howard, Commander of the Guards' Brigade. Ken retired as a Captain after 20 years of service and returned to Darlington with his family, now expanded by the arrival of their second daughter Katherine.

During their time in Darlington, Ken became the first Secretary of the Council of Voluntary Service. Community work, with local organisations, together with a course at Work University, was a good experience for the beginning of a career in social service departments.

The family came to Harrogate in 1972. As Community Liaison Officer, Ken enjoyed the scope of his work, covering the Harrogate area from Poppleton to Ingleton. Ken and Ann were delighted to settle in this lovely town and appreciated weekend family trips into the Dales.

Ken was proud of his accomplishment of building up a fleet of fully-adopted minibuses on a very limited budget. Supporting and equipping about 20-30 meals-on-wheels and lunch clubs made for a very busy but rewarding life. He retired after 20 years of loyal service in what he claimed was the best job in the county.

Ken's first contact with Wesley Methodist Chapel started about 1975 when he set up and ran a *Second Thursday Lunch* for some years in Lower Hall—from his office across the street. With sandwich lunches provided by the indomitable Mrs Eileen Lyon and 'her girls', this brought together voluntary and statutory social workers to liaise and learn about each others' jobs and learn what the new social services department was all about.

Ann and Ken were devoted to each other, and enjoyed just short of 40 years of marriage. When Ann died Ken regularly attended St. Peter's, where 'by accident' he thought the next service was to be 'combined' at Wesley. This was not so, but his welcome at Wesley was so friendly he decided to stay. He felt this was no accident, but spirit-led and Ken became Treasurer, first of *Forward Together*, then the Chapel, for 15 years.

Ken downsized his home and moved to his much-loved apartment in Oak Tree Lodge. His days were brightened by his outlook on the trees, occupied by squirrels and birds which would regularly visit his bird feeder. He enjoyed the friendship of his neighbours and his daily walks in the Valley Gardens.

Ken had a long and fulfilling life, enjoying being an uncle to so many, and keeping in contact with his extended family...even those in Australia. His 90th birthday, just over a year ago, was a great opportunity for a grand reunion. He often looked back at the photos of the event and spoke fondly of it, as have so many Selkirk family members who attended.

*Ken wrote the above notes, planning ahead as was his wont. Gilbert and Sullivan's HMS Pinafore, played at the end of his memorial service was in remembrance of his first meeting with Ann and representative of his own 'happy thankfulness'. Liz and Kath added 'We can also be happy, and thankful for having him in our lives.' Ken's friends from Wesley can echo those sentiments. Rest in Peace Ken, we shall miss you very much indeed.*



## WESLEY GUILD

David provided interesting and often humorous dissertations between all the hymns whilst we all drew breath but it was a joy to observe a sea of smiling faces at the end of the afternoon. Thank you once again David.

David has opened our season several times and we have provisionally booked him again for next year. We were pleased to welcome wife Ann and friend Ann who came with him and helped to raise the strain! One hymn which we by-passed but which David read to us was No. 415 'I should like to die said Willie, if my papa could die too'. This caused much mirth and I can recommend you read the rest if you have access to the words. I hesitate to repeat David's choice of adjectives which he used to describe the words of this hymn!

We were delighted to welcome Helen at our meeting following her surgery but we missed Nancy and Margaret who are both recovering from recent injuries. Sheila too was indisposed and we remembered these and all those known to ourselves in our prayers.

Then surely I was born.

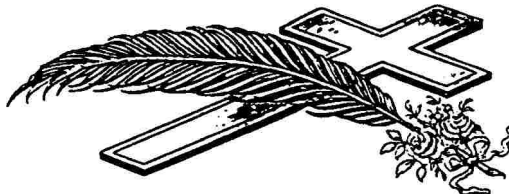
With monstrous head and sickening cry

And smite a rock.

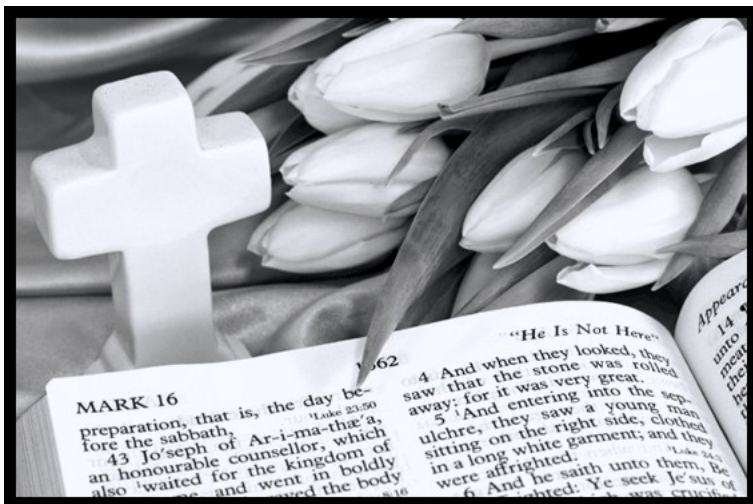
