#### A bit of Harrogate history from Philip

2023. am. 9th Jan. The setting over moon Hattersley's (Hope it shows, just left of the building). Hattersley's was a Coaching Inn built in 1815, renamed Brunswick Hotel 1883. The Brunswick station built in 1848 (closed in 1862) was named after the hotel. The hotel was renamed The Prince of Wales Mansions in 1866. It was converted into apartments in 1960.



#### A bit of a science lesson from Les

In spite of feeling poorly Christine ventured out very briefly to take pictures of a hoar frost. Hoar frost is a type of feathery frost that forms as a result of specific climatic conditions. The word 'hoar' comes from old English and refers to the old age appearance of the frost: the way the ice crystals form makes it look like white hair or a

beard. Ground frost forms when the air is still and cold, usually on clear winter nights. Water vapour in the air condenses on solid surfaces, and as the surface temperature drops below 0°C, ice crystals form. Hoar frost requires slightly different conditions. It forms when the water vapour in the air comes into contact with solid surfaces that are already below freezing point. Ice crystals form immediately, and the ice continues to grow as more water vapour is frozen. On a still night, it can grow well on tree branches, where the surface temperature is unlikely to rise above zero for several hours. The size of the frost



that forms depends on how much water vapour is available to 'feed' the ice crystals as they grow. Hoar frost has a distinctive appearance as it forms hair-like or feathery structures as it grows.

lan shares his desert island discs. Unfortunately he is only allowed to take eight. The good news is when he is on a desert island he can play the music as loud as he likes so he won't have to take his headphones.

I got a bit of a shock a couple of days ago when Judith said she needed my Desert Island choices by Wednesday. Right, I thought let's make a short list. First a confession, I am slightly addicted to rock, folk and blues music

and I like it played quite loud – well, too loud for Eileen anyway – so thank heaven for headphones! So here's the shortlist: Joan Baez, Bob Dylan, The Beatles, The Rolling Stones, The Beach Boys, Bruce Springsteen, The Pentangle, Steeleye Span, Fairport Convention, Tim Hardin, Fleetwood Mac, The Byrds, Simon and Garfunkel, Tom Paxton, Jefferson Airplane, Joe Cocker, Leonard Cohen, The Mamas and the Papas, The Lovin' Spoonful, Eric Clapton, The Kinks, The Yardbirds and The Animals.

I'll stop there – tho' I could go on. So what could be simpler than choosing 8 from those? Here goes:

The Beatles: Eleanor Rigby. I have to start with The Beatles. They started my interest in pop music and they were the backdrop to my 3 years at university in Liverpool. I like all their work but my favourite LP was Sergeant Pepper although my favourite song was 'Eleanor Rigby' from the Revolver LP. I heard them play live at the RFK Stadium in Washington DC on 15 August 1966 – to get in we had to cross a line of Ku Klux Klan members who had been upset by John Lennon. To keep my Beatle levels topped up, I always try to usher the Bootleg Beatles concerts when they come to the Royal Hall.

Joan Baez: Sad Eyed Lady of the Lowlands. I came to Joan Baez before Bob Dylan but I love her voice singing Dylan's songs. My favourite album is 'Any Day Now' which is made up entirely her singing Dylan's songs. Sad Eyed Lady of the Lowlands is my favourite song. I've seen her perform live 5 times but the most memorable one was during my time in Washington.

Desert Island Discs continued

She was due to give a concert in Constitution Hall but she upset the Daughters of the American Revolution with her views on the Vietnam War and was banned from using it. So she gave a free concert on the Mall in Washington – an estimated 30,000 people turned up and I shall never forget her singing 'We Shall Overcome' with a backing group of 30,000! 'Kumbaya' was pretty impressive too.

Bob Dylan: The Times They Are a Changing. I just love Dylan, he is a brilliant songwriter and social commentator. He also inspired one of my favourite bands - The Byrds. I find it hard to choose an album, let alone a song. However, I would probably opt for the Freewheelin' album and 'The Times They are a Changing' as my favourite song.

The Rolling Stones: Paint it Black. There was a time when you either loved the Beatles or the Stones. I never got that - I liked both of them. The power and drive of the Stones at their best was incredible. The song that evokes it best for me is 'Paint it Black' – both moving and powerful.

Bruce Springsteen: We shall Overcome: The Seeger Sessions. I came to The Boss rather late in life. He has done so many great albums but my favourite is The Seeger Sessions.

The Pentangle: Light Flight. I'm not sure how many times I have seen Pentangle live. However, the sound of them singing 'Bruton Town' got me started on my folk rock period and led me on to Steeleye Span and Fairport Convention - and various spin-offs. After one concert I invited them back to my hall in Liverpool where we had a party going on – 3 of them came along. It was quite weird making coffee for them in my room after watching them earlier at the Philharmonic Hall. I've chosen Light Flight to take to the island.

Simon and Garfunkel: The Sound of Silence. I have loved Simon and Garfunkel's work for years. My favourite album is Bookends but my favourite songs are 'The Sound of Silence' and 'Homeward Bound'. There is a brilliant video of their famous Concert in Central Park which is well worth watching. (The Simon and Garfunkel Story is on at the Royal Hall later this year – it is always worth seeing). I am also conscious that I have ignored their solo careers – Paul Simon's Graceland is one of my all-time favourites.

#### Desert Island Discs continued

Leonard Cohen: Hallelujah. Cohen is a great songwriter and poet. I love 'Suzanne', 'So Long Marianne' and 'Bird On a Wire' but my favourite is 'Hallelujah'.

The Gloria is a joyful hymn of praise and Puccini's *Mass for Four Voices and Orchestra*, as it was originally known, written as his graduation thesis when he was only 22 years of age, is an unmistakably youthful work, but shows a mature grasp of musical conventions. The *Messa di Gloria* is evidence of his operatic promise. Puccini himself wrote: "The Almighty touched me with his little finger and said, 'Write for the theatre - mind, only for the theatre!'

This is matched well by Gounod's St Cecilia Mass which is a skilled blend of sacred and secular (operatic) styles of composition, his outstanding gift for composing enthralling melodies shines through all the movements.

Giacomo Puccini: 'Inspiration is an awakening, a quickening of all man's faculties, and it is manifested in all high artistic achievements.'

Our Chair of District Rev. Leslie Newon wrote a short blog for the The Methodist Church's 'New Places for New People' movement. Rev. Leslie writes: It's something I need to repeatedly remind myself of: 'It's still early days' for this movement; but God is most surely at work in enabling a new vision to come to life... See below Leslie's blog.

'The BBC World Service celebrated its 90th Anniversary in December 2022. It's the world's largest broadcaster reaching a weekly audience of around 364 million people through more than 40 languages.

However, back in 1932 expectations were carefully managed! In its opening programme Director General Sir John Reith said 'Don't expect too much in the early days; for some time we shall transmit comparatively simple programmes...to provide evidence as to the



type of material most suitable for the service in each zone. The programmes will neither be very interesting nor very good'.

New Places for New People continued.


I've found this origin story so helpful. I am certain of the vital, Kingdom significance of the 'New Places for New People' movement. So many encouraging and hope-filled stories are already emerging of God's 'doing a new thing'. However, I'm often impatient: longing for more, and more now?!

Let's remind ourselves that God's timing is perfect. 'But these things I plan won't happen right away. Slowly, steadily, surely, the time approaches when the vision will be fulfilled. If it seems slow, do not despair, for these things will surely come to pass. Just be patient! They will not be overdue a single day'/ (Habakkuk 2-3)..

So, as we jouney into 2023, take heart'll It's still early days! But God is inviting, inspiring and encouraging us onwards, and God's timing Is perfect.'

#### **LOVE DIVINE ALL LOVES EXCELLING (StF 507)**

A favourite hymn of many and one of the best known of Charles Wesley's hymns. Apparently, it was intended as a Christianization of the song 'Fairest Isle' sung by Venus in Act 5 of John Dryden and Henry Purcell's semi-opera King Arthur (1691) on which the first verse is modelled.

#### Wesley wrote:

Love Divine, all Loves excelling, Joy of Heaven to Earth come down, Fix in us thy humble Dwelling, All thy faithful Mercies crown;

#### Dryden had written:

Fairest Isle, all Isles Excelling, Seat of Pleasures, and of Loves; Venus here, will chuse her Dwelling, And forsake her Cyprian Groves.

In Dryden's song, the goddess of love chooses the Isle of Britain over her native Cyprus; in Wesley's hymn divine love itself is asked to choose the human heart as its residence over its native heaven.

The last lines of the hymn are also adapted from existing material. It has been suggested that Wesley's final lines, Till we cast our Crowns before Thee, Lost in Wonder, Love, and Praise! derive from the opening lines of the words written by Joseph Addison (1672-1719): When all thy mercies, O my God, My rising soul surveys; Transported with the view, I'm lost In wonder, love, and praise.

There is another verse in *Love Divine* (originally the second verse) that does not appear in our Methodist Hymn Books, due to some theological concerns, not least by John Wesley himself, but which is in many of today's hymn books of other denominations:

Breathe, O breathe thy loving Spirit Into every troubled breast; Let us all in thee inherit, Let us find the promised rest;

#### Love Divine continued

Take away the love of sinning; Alpha and Omega be; End of faith, as its beginning, Set our hearts at liberty.

This hymn is now set to Blaenwern in our recent hymn books. However, I can remember having a copy of Blaenwern cellotaped into my Methodist Hymn Book when I was a young organist and MHB was our only hymn book and the only tunes were 'Love Divine' and 'Bithynia', neither very well known. Blaenwern was composed by William Pentro Rowlands (1860-1937). The tune is named after Blaenwern Farm near Tufton, Pembrokeshire, where Rowlands sent his son from Porth to stay with friends of the family to convalesce as it was thought the fresh air would assist his recovery: he named the tune in honour of them.

In the United Kingdom Blaenwern has come to be used as the prevalent setting for the hymn Love Divine, All Loves Excelling, but also in other settings including the Welsh Deued Dyddiau O Bob Cymysg by William Williams Pantycelyn, and Calon Lân by Daniel James. It also became familiar to a wider audience through the Billy Graham crusades when it was used as a setting to What a Friend We Have in Jesus.

As a setting for *Love Divine* it is a popular choice at English weddings and was voted as one of Britain's ten favourite hymns in October 2005. *Love Divine, All Loves Excelling*, set to Blaenwern, was sung at the wedding blessing of Prince Charles and Camilla Parker-Bowles and it was also selected as one of three hymns sung at the wedding of Prince William and Catherine Middleton, the others being *Guide Me, O Thou Great Redeemer*, set to Cwm Rhondda, and *Jerusalem*. The tune was also used for *Love Divine, All Loves Excelling* at the funeral of former British Prime Minister, Margaret Thatcher in 2013, the wedding of Princess Eugenie and Jack Brooksbank in 2018 and the funeral of Queen Elizabeth II in 2022.

I've learned that no matter what happens, or how bad it seems today, life does go on, and it will be better tomorrow. I've learned that you can tell a lot about a person by the way he/she handles these three things: a rainy day, lost luggage, and tangled Christmas tree lights. I've learned that regardless of your relationship with your parents, you'll miss them when they're gone from your life. I've learned that making a "living" is not the same thing as making a "life." I've learned that life sometimes gives you a second chance. I've learned that you shouldn't go through life with a catcher's mitt on both hands; you need to be able to throw something back. I've learned that whenever I decide something with an open heart. I usually make the right decision. I've learned that even when I have pains. I don't have to be one. I've learned that every day you should reach out and touch someone. People love a warm hug, or just a friendly pat on the back. I've learned that I still have a lot to learn.
