MINISTER'S LETTER

As I write I have just returned from a weekend away at the District 'Flourish' event at Scarborough and a Planning Meeting for the Methodist Conference next year.

At Flourish we were encouraged to recognise that our Christian living is not solely based on that time or event when we became aware of, and committed ourselves to Christ, but our resolution to following his teaching and example in our lives. From then on, we were told, we should have been continuing to be flourishing and growing Christian people.

We are in the Year of Testimony encouraged by the President and Vice President of the Methodist Church, when it was suggested that individual members are encouraged to speak to the members of the church where they worship of their here and now experience of being a follower of Christ and part of the Christian church.

I recognise that at Wesley we have not formally emphasised this. Perhaps we ought to have done so. It is and would be a challenge to stand in a service on Sunday and tell the congregation our testimony for the today, and not just how we came to be a part of the church at whatever stage in our lives, as a teenager or well after those light-hearted days of youth.

We are challenged to speak out a sentence or two about being Christian today.

After Flourish I came home and went off immediately to Telford and to the making of arrangements for the Methodist Conference next June.

So it was that I returned on Tuesday evening from a tiring day in Committee and delays in stations for trains. I was on the York to Harrogate train for the final spell. I looked up and saw a gentleman coming towards me and I smiled. He took that as permission to start talking to me as he sat down on the other side of the aisle.

We talked for most of the journey to Starbeck. I, about my tiring day being involved in the arrangement for the Conference for 500+ people augmented for two days by the Opening Ceremonials, Presidential Installations and followed by Ordination Sunday of 1500 people. That followed on from Flourish where we had a potential of 1200 people but they did not all appear on the same day.

He spoke of orienteering exercises which he had planned for hundreds of people under canvas.

We spoke of similar experiences and working with young people and older people and at one point I told him of the song *If I can help somebody as I pass along then ...* Told because he had never heard it!!

I had been open about being a Christian minister and he was not phased by that. Air cadets come into it with the motto *Venture Adventure* and its challenge.

When we parted I felt that our conversation had been illuminating, educative and fascinating. Had I stated my testimony? Yes I think I had because even though I did not say I do this because I am a servant and follower of Jesus, I did specifically say I am a Christian Minister and I firmly believe in Being and Living Faith.

It was in that frame that we were present with the Volunteers in Wesley during the cycling event and it is in that sort of understanding that all of us are called to be followers of Christ. And all for the sake of a smiled greeting. Have you? Dare you? Could you? do that. It's not what you say it's the way that you say it - not what you do it's the way that you do it.

We are looking for people to tell the congregation about encounters or how otherwise they share their faith or have a faith which is vital to them and which has become their *raison d'être*. Your turn next week??

SENIOR STEWARD'S LETTER TO CHURCH COUNCIL OCTOBER 2019

So what's the story...?

At our last two church councils we have discussed briefly the Methodist Way of Life as outlined in the simple expression of *Our Calling*. I believe a continued, honest and positive review and discussion of our calling is an important part of the role and leadership of our church council and stewards team.

At our Local Arrangement Service on 17 March 2019, we looked at *Our Calling*; the calling for the Church and the calling for individuals. During our Wesley Guild Sunday service in June we reflected on the importance, power and expression of friendship within the Guild movement and as individuals and church in response to our calling.

I really like how section 9 on our meeting agenda headed **Conversation on the Work of God** helps us to identify the four key areas of Our Calling. This in turn allows us to reflect on our current activities and mission work and also reflect on opportunities for change, development and 'dreams'.

This year's presidential theme is 'So What's the Story...?' It's meant to initiate storytelling across our Church in the year ahead, because our voice matters and deserves to be heard. Evangelism is a critical part of our calling, and yet the 'E' word can be scary, as many of us doubt ourselves as evangelists. And yet throughout the different stages of our lives, how many of us have enjoyed telling stories; both our own and those of others, that have touched our hearts!

If we seek to build up relationships whenever and wherever we are, we will be offered chances to share our story and as we share our story we will be offered chances to share our faith. All are called, we all have the ability to talk about God in our lives to tell others why we do the things we do: why you make casseroles and cakes for others? why you speak out for others? why you have the values you have? why you go to church and pray? Many others will be able to share how they have been able to continually get through personal times of tragedy and despair.

We tell our stories in different ways, we talk in different ways, some get excited and offer personal songs of praise, others simply offer Whispers of Love. But as Christians we know a truth that is offered to all; the truth that we are loved by our God.

Be generous, offer a gift to the world that no one else can offer; offer yourself! Offer your story... Through the Grace of God we can all be evangelists and story tellers and fulfil our calling. Wow!

We gave warm thanks to Katharine Carmichael upon her retirement from her pastoral visitor role after many years of commitment and dedication.

In my role as church safeguarding officer I have recently attended a circuit meeting for all churches to help us maintain our churches as 'safe spaces' for all. We have also just agreed our Wesley Chapel Safeguarding Policy and this is on display downstairs on the notice board near the back door.

The Circuit Safeguarding officer Margaret Grant has retired after many years in the role and Rev Grace Cauldwell has agreed to take over for the short term.

Currently all Wesley Chapel safeguarding training is up to date for those helping to create 'safer space' for children and vulnerable adults within the Methodist Church. However next year a number of us will be requested to go on some 'refresher' training courses. Shelagh Outhwaite will be attending a Foundation course as soon as possible and will then be joining our group of visitors.

Thank you to everyone who helps Wesley Chapel be a place of welcome, warmth and safety whether as a pastoral visitor or member of our church family.

FLOURISH AT SCARBOROUGH

On the weekend of 18-20 October people from all over the District travelled to Scarborough for Flourish organised by the District Office. In our district there are 15 circuits and 220 churches. See the new Connexion magazine 'Going for Growth in Yorkshire'

The weekend started on Friday evening with a celebration led in worship by Burniston Methodist Church. This church has been blessed with many talented musicians and afterwards a member of that church said this had been the case for numerous years.

The room where the opening celebrations were held didn't have enough chairs and more had to be brought in. It was expected that only about three hundred would come on the Friday evening and over double that number turned up. The Chair of District, Rev. Leslie Newton explained the weekend programme and set the scene for the weekend. Following this there was an after-hours programme.

The Spa lifts taking people up and down to the event were open from 8.30am to 11.30pm during the event.

Saturday was a very full day and the choice was left to each individual person. A youth dawn reflective communion in a beach hut started the day.

At ten the Bible study was led by the Rev. Ashley Cooper, Principal Cliff College who spoke on Acts 16 v 16-34. The Rev. Ashley referred to the passage in Romans 12. Do not conform any longer to the pattern of this world, but be transformed. We need to be people who stand out. Daily example from Acts 12 and 16 word and deed. It was not a good day for Paul and Silas locked up in prison after having been stripped and beaten. They were put in a cell and their feet fastened in stocks. Paul and Silas could be wondering, why has this happened? They believed in what God had asked them to do healing and witnessing to Jesus Christ. How would you respond? Verse 25 praying and singing hymns and the other prisoners LISTENING. Next the earthquake, the jailer trembling thinking all the prisoners would have escaped. The jailer brought them out of their cell and they brought him to faith. Believe in the Lord Jesus and you will be saved, it goes on to say he had come to believe in God he and his whole family. The people of God we need to stand out. There is no dress rehearsal, we only have one time at getting things right. *Continued p11*

BACK COVER PAINTING With the Rainbow, 1917 by Paul Klee.

Paul Klee (December 18 1879 – June 29 1940) was a Swiss painter of German nationality. He was influenced by many different art styles in his work, including [expressionism](#), [cubism](#) and [surrealism](#); he was art -teacher at the Bauhaus with [Kandinsky](#); they exchanged their ideas on art very intensively. https://en.wikiquote.org/wiki/Paul_Klee

There were two significant effects of the war on Paul Klee. First was a greater propulsion towards abstraction. 'One deserts the realm of the here and now to transfer one's activity into a realm of the yonder...The more horrible this world, the more abstract our art.' The second was the eventual protection from the front , as too many artists were being killed. *With the Rainbow* was painted in 1917 when Klee was a clerk at a flying school and given a small room in which to continue his painting.

Interview by Peter Hirschmann, Wesley Concerts Patrons Secretary, with Andrew Hitchen in September 2019

Wesley Centre Concerts: 25 years old and going stronger. Andrew Hitchen was awarded the BEM in the Queen's Birthday Honours in June 2019 for services to music in Harrogate. We met over coffee in Betty's when he explained the connection.

Peter: How did the Wesley Centre Concerts start?

Andrew: In 1994 Olive Dobson, a life-long member of Wesley Chapel and member of the choir, made a bequest of £100 000 with the aim of among others, enhancing the musical life of the chapel, as well, as more widely, in Harrogate. The chapel decided to buy a concert-quality Yamaha piano for £33,000.

Peter: How did you get involved?

Andrew: My family have been members of the congregation since the 1890s and I grew up a member. Once we had acquired the piano, I offered to organize professional piano recitals. The response amazed me: I was being approached by agents seeking dates for their artists. The series has grown gradually from these modest beginnings to ten lunch-time and two to three evening recitals each season. The recent reordering of the chapel gave us the flexibility to add chamber and instrumental music to the mix.

Peter: Do you play the piano yourself?

Andrew: No. My father, who was a family dentist, was a keen amateur pianist and organist and there was always music in the house growing up. I became a lawyer but gave it up after 25 years in favour of teaching English as a foreign language to students from Europe and China.

Peter: To what do you attribute the success of the Wesley Centre Concerts?

Andrew: A number of factors. We have an enthusiastic audience whom performers find attentive and responsive. They like the ambience of the chapel and its sound quality: it is often described as the 'Wigmore Hall of the north'. Another factor is the hospitality we provide the musicians. We try to make them welcome when they arrive at the church for rehearsal. Moreover, many of the musicians stay with us, and my wife Ulrike and I endeavour to make them feel as at home as possible. Also, we have a dedicated team who provide a light lunch for the audience before the recitals and a very reliable group of volunteers who help in many different ways.

Peter: Do the artists like the piano?

Andrew: They appreciate its sound quality and the fact that it is in good condition. They also like the acoustic in the chapel, which is shoebox in design with wooden panels. Recently the piano was showing signs of wear and we benefited from the advice of three of our performers, not least Jean-Efflam Bavouzet who introduced us to Yamaha's top man in the UK. After 24 years the piano was still in remarkably good condition but nonetheless getting it back to concert standard cost £10,000. It is a measure of the unstinting support we get from our audience that we raised the money in ten weeks.

Peter: How do you find performers?

Andrew. Let me answer that by telling you something about the programme for this season. There will be two evening piano recitals. Clare Hammond, the hands (and young face) in the film, *The Lady in the Van* with Maggie Smith, gave a lunchtime recital here two years ago. She contacted me to say she was making her debut on London's South Bank in June 2020, so I invited her back to give the same programme here on 16 May 2020. And the same goes for Julien Brocal, who I initially invited last year as the BBC Music Magazine's Newcomer of the Year in 2018: he is making his Wigmore Hall debut in March and so is coming here again in February. As to the lunchtime recitals, the pianist Simon Lepper is a good friend of the Wesley concerts and he has recommended the young soprano Soraya Mafi with whom he is currently working: that is in November 2019. Susan Tomes lecture-recitals have proved very rewarding and she is coming for the fourth time in December. I booked both the Fidelio Trio in February and the violin-piano duo, Lorenzo Gatto and Julien Libeer in June, after hearing their CDs sent to me by their agents. I should also add that we are frequently approached by agents for 'run through' recitals prior to performances in larger venues.

Peter: That sounds as if you are pushing the boat out. How do you manage financially?

Andrew: The cost of tickets is kept low: it will be £8 this season, so we rely on grants and donations. Four years ago we launched a Patrons Scheme and thanks to twenty generous supporters we now have money in the bank. The Liz and Terry Bramhall Foundation have also been very supportive.

This year's Presidential theme is: 'So what's the story?'

We are invited, encouraged, to tell our story – to one another and to people we know outside the church. In this Circuit we are supposed to be including a time of testimony in each service. The idea is to summarise in six words how we came to faith and then expand it a little to explain – but not to give a long rambling life story.

My six words are 'I was loved into the Kingdom'.

The brief story behind that is the Bible study group I went to not long after we first came to Wesley 40 years ago. It was led by Tony Hitchen and had lots of wonderful, loving people in the group – some of whom are still with us.

I was an atheist then, and for all the arguments and debates about the nature of God and salvation and miracles and the rest of the theology we covered, it was the people that won me over – and not just the ones in that group but so many other wonderful people at Wesley.

I realised that if their faith – whatever it was (and believe me it wasn't always clear or consistent) – if their faith helped to make them so loving and caring, then what was I doing trying to resist?

So I wasn't bribed into the Kingdom by promises of eternity in heaven, nor by threats of eternity in hell, nor by the Bible or church doctrine or academic theological arguments. In fact I had to put most of that aside because it was getting in the way.

I was loved into the Kingdom.

At the last Circuit Meeting, Superintendent Ben said we need to develop our own language for expressing our faith and we sang a hymn that begins:

We need another language
That we can live on earth
To move us further forward,
To give the Word new birth

So What's Your Story continued

You might think that this is all about religious jargon and that we should stop using words and concepts that mean nothing to those outside the church. And that is certainly part of the message.

But the first verse goes on to say:

To live the love of Jesus,
Incarnate through our lives,
Aligned with God's own spirit,
The love of God survives.

If we are to make an impression in the world around us, it's not enough to tell our story or preach the Gospel. We are that other language. First and foremost we must live the love of Jesus, transforming God's love from words into reality: loving people into the Kingdom.

This is pretty much what I said at Wesley on 20 October, and afterwards people were keen to give me their six word testimony – although it's harder than it looks! It would be good to include this as a feature of our services this year, but if you are a bit nervous about doing it 'live', I'm sure Judith would be delighted to print yours in Focus – perhaps a six (or so) word summary followed by a brief paragraph of explanation.

SELECTED NOTES FROM THE CHURCH COUNCIL MEETING HELD 8 OCTOBER 2019

Present: Rev Ann Fox (Chair), Rev Trevor Dixon, Les Sudron (minute taker), Ed Walton (Circuit Steward), and seven members. Apologies were received from Rev. Ben Clowes and four members.

Ann opened the meeting with a welcome to everyone and led the opening devotions.

The members stood in silence to remember Mrs Doreen Jackson and Mr Raymond Pullan. Ann led a prayer of remembrance and thanksgiving.

Minutes of the last meeting held on 19 February 2019, previously circulated, were approved and signed.

An updated Safeguarding Policy for Wesley Chapel was adopted by Church Council and signed by Rev Ann Fox. This will be displayed on relevant notice board near boiler room. The Policy will be reviewed at each October meeting.

The Data Mapping Form had been circulated in advance to all members and confirmed as still accurate; one small addition to be made re Church Website.

Health and Safety and Risk Assessments were now undertaken by the Wesley Centre staff and trustees.

Matters to/from Conference, Synod or Circuit:

Trustee forms – self-disclosure. All church trustees have to sign an Automatic disqualification declaration and all members present did this. All absent trustees need to sign the form that they will be given.


