

Dear Friends

#### **Message from your Pastoral Secretary**

**What is your name...?** I have always been encouraged by the words of Jesus recalled in Mark Chapter 5 verse 9. A man with serious mental health issues is raging at him and the first thing Jesus says is 'what is your name'?

Most commentators suggest that this is Jesus seeking to help the man reconnect with his own personality, inviting him to try and remember who he really is in spite of the demons in his head. Although this is very likely I have often thought first and foremost the words immediately shows the man that Jesus is concerned about him, Jesus reflecting without hesitation that the man is important to him and wanting to hear his story and help him.

As pastoral visitors this is such an enabling example of Jesus showing us the power of connecting and listening to the people that we are privileged to meet and support. Our names are a vital part of who we are and we all remember the embarrassing times when we meet someone and just cannot recall their names! If we start any conversation with a greeting by name or if unknown by asking for a name, we usually find that a relationship can be established.

What's in a name? My first born was called Matthew meaning 'gift of God', his brother Andrew 'manly' and the youngest Daniel 'God has judged'. My grandson Rowan from the Irish Ruadhan means " little red (haired) one" so a bit off the mark at the moment!

God's name is often translated LORD, but the Hebrew would be pronounced something like Yahweh,' and is built on the word for 'I am.' reminding us each time that 'God absolutely is.'

And we have another name central to our lives – JESUS.

'Jesus – the name high over all, In hell, or earth, or sky! Angels revere, and nations fall, And devils fear and fly.'

#### In Memory of Brian Blakey



It was never Joy and Brian's intention to worship at different churches when they moved to Harrogate but circumstances dictated otherwise. Prior to Joy's permanent move here Brian had done the rounds of various Methodist churches and as he was made welcome at Harlow Hill, and it was within walking distance of their home, he decided to transfer his membership there. Meantime Joy and Lynne took their mum to Wesley Chapel's Flower Festival at the time of the refurbishment and Joy knew instantly that

she could be happy there as Wesley was a replica of Trinity in Scunthorpe where she and Brian had first met at the age of five/six in Sunday School! The rest, they say, is history. Brian was soon co-opted onto the porch rota at Harlow and Phyll Coggan always referred to him as 'the book monitor'. He also joined the Harlow Mens' Forum and in spite of failing eye sight was Treasurer for several years.

Brian was then approached by the late Ken Dransfield with a view to helping out at Forward Together at Wesley. Brian became speaker finder and led the meetings for some considerable time. In the early days he also provided scones for afternoon tea – this was after members had partaken in the delicious lunches provided at Forward Together! Brian was no stranger to Wesley as he was a regular attender of the Wesley Guild.

When Brian was no longer able to walk to Harlow Hill he transferred his membership to Wesley and was pleased to be able to worship with Joy. He was made to feel very welcome at Wesley and soon felt at home there. Always a fan of organ music he appreciated the quality of Graham's playing on Wesley's fine instrument and always enjoyed listening to his playing at the end of the service.

Brian became a member of the Harrogate Mens' Probus, Joy became a member of the Ladies Probus and together they made some very good and lasting friendships.

Joy and Brian realised how very fortunate they were to have retired to Harrogate and enjoyed all the facilities of this beautiful town. Brian especially appreciated regular visits to the Royal Hall, Convention Centre and the Harrogate Theatre for plays and musical events. Whilst he was still able to drive he enjoyed exploring the highways and byways around Harrogate and in the Yorkshire Dales.

#### **Easter Offering 2019 : Longer tables, lower fences**

The EASTER OFFERING 2019 dedication service *Longer tables, lower fences,* features stories of shared hospitality across the world. The worship encourages us to consider how we might build longer tables, rather than higher fences, as we share whatever we have and connect with our neighbours.

#### **About Easter Offering.**

Each year, the Methodist Church holds an Easter Offering dedication service. This tradition dates back to 1883, when women in Manchester collected £32 for Missionary work overseas from 'Christmas pennies' at family gatherings on Christmas Day. In March 1884, the London Districts distributed Easter envelopes and collecting bags asking for a penny a head, and collected around £100. In 1900, Women's Work raised £1,655 for the work of overseas missions.

Since that time, each successive Methodist women's movement has encouraged donations in support of God's mission. In recent years, Methodist Women in Britain have taken responsibility (supported by the Methodist World Church Relationships Team) for producing resources including an annual service of dedication, often used widely around the Connexion as a circuit service.

All the money raised through the Easter Offering goes to the World Mission Fund of the Methodist Church in Britain to be allocated for work in our 65 Partner Churches around the world. This money has been used by overseas partners to fund such work as enabling young women in north India to undertake nurse and midwifery training, and supporting Brazilian women to work in their churches with vulnerable women and children, developing women's leadership roles and integrating culture and art into worship. By sending out training resources, many thousands of women have been able to participate and develop this work across Brazil.

In 2016, collections from Easter Offering services raised a massive £437,798, thanks to the generosity of Methodist men, women and children. We thank Methodist Women in Britain for running this appeal, and you for making a difference by contributing to God's mission in this way.

This year's Easter Offering Service in our circuit is to be held at Gracious Street on Sunday 19 May 6.30pm led by Rev. Ruth Parry.



#### **District Youth Event**

On the first of February there was a district youth event at Ashville College with the President of the Methodist Conference, Rev. Michaela Youngson attending and the Chair of Yorkshire North and East District, the Rev. Leslie Newton. Unfortunately we had snow on that day, which prevented some groups from attending. Young people arrived from round the district, boarders from Ashville and local young people from

Harrogate, which probably made it 150 young people. The evening began with the band leading worship, followed by prayer. Unknown to everybody one person was given a ten pound note as people came in. This person was asked to go to the front to answer a few questions, beginning with 'what did you do to receive the money?'. The boy replied 'nothing'. For Christians God is the Creator of all that is, the supreme architect of the universe, the source of all beauty. Every time we say the Creed, we restate this belief, "I believe in God, the Father Almighty, creator of heaven and earth." Genesis tells two stories of creation and although most of us do not believe that everything was created in 6 days, we can agree to the stages of creation as set out in the first book of the Bible.

We also believe that Jesus was there with God from the beginning of creation – every Christmas we hear those familiar words from the first chapter of the Gospel of John, 'in the beginning was the Word and the Word was with God and the Word was God.'

In the book of Genesis we also learn that humankind was given a role in creation – a responsibility to steward what God had created and to share in the ongoing work of creation. We are honoured with the role of being cocreators with God and Psalm 8 tells us not to underestimate ourselves for we have 'been created a little lower than the angels.'

So 'creativity' is an important concept and an important activity for Christians.

In the past if a person used the word 'creativity' the most common understanding among hearers would be that the word referred to the creative process of artists and writers, composers and designers.

But there has been a change recently, the word 'creativity' has become a buzz word in our time; some would say a meaningless buzz word. The world of business and finance has now co-opted the idea of creativity so that to be creative now means to dream up new products and services and bring them to the market. Everyone, even in the dullest of jobs is now urged to be creative and entrepreneurial, which really only means finding new ways to survive in the hostile and precarious economic environment in which we live. with less (money).

But 'creativity' has come to mean something else as well in these straitened times where austerity has been the watchword in recent years. In this context the word has come to be used to mean finding out how to do more

When Jeremy Hunt says that the NHS needs to be more creative he means 'we are always going to be facing tight budgets so we must learn to find cheaper ways to do things.' Such 'creativity' has affected all sectors – local Government can no longer afford to run libraries so 'creative' solutions are needed – namely using volunteers instead of trained librarians. Technology is called into action as a 'creative' solution to reduce costs – on-line and on-phone consultations between doctor/nurse and patient begin to replace face to face meetings.

This use of 'creativity' has also infected the churches – Local Arrangements when preachers are in short supply or shared services where a number of congregations come together. How long before services will be streamed live from one church to others? These things are not the worst things in the world and can sometimes have very positive spin-off but we should be frank with ourselves and recognise that they are ways of doing more or the same with less.

As Christians we need to reclaim this word 'creativity' – it is the action of God and of people seeking to work out God's plan for his world. When we gather people who are lonely together for a chat and cup of tea, we are being creative. When we seek ways of minimising our footprint on our environment we are being creative. When we offer up worship complete with meaningful prayers, wonderful music and challenging sermons we are being creative. There should be no austerity in the church for our God is a God of generosity and abundance and urges us to be people of generosity and hospitality too.

Let us reclaim this word and realise that all that we do as we seek to be God's cocreators in the world is endlessly creative, never defined by cost and available to all. The following hymn by Ruth Duck helps us to understand our role as partners in creation.

We cannot own the sunlit sky, the moon, the wild-flowers growing, For we are part of all that is within life's river flowing. With open hands receive and share the gifts of God's creation, That all may have abundant life in every earthly nation.

When bodies shiver in the night and weary wait for morning, When children have no bread but tears, and war horns sound their warning, God calls humanity to awake, to join in common labour, That all may have abundant life, oneness with their neighbour.

God calls humanity to join as partners in creating a future free from want or fear. Life's goodness celebrating, that new world beckons from afar, Invites our shared endeavor that all might have abundant life and peace endure forever.
