MINISTER'S LETTER

In March 2025, the Circuit Meeting agreed not to seek a replacement for Rev'd Lesley Taylor when she retires in August 2026 because we are highly unlikely to be matched with a replacement.

Ultimately the numbers of available ministers across the Connexion has dropped dramatically over recent years. The gap between circuits seeking a minister and the number of available ministers continues to grow.

The circuit meeting did note the decision would have a knock-on effect with churches but also recognised an opportunity to prepare and find a new sustainable way of being circuit and church.

In response to the decision, the circuit leadership team began a process of listening to the leadership teams of all thirteen churches. This listening exercise shaped further conversations and potential suggestions of how the circuit could regroup.

On November 15th, members of each church were invited to a day of further reflection on three potential suggestions. This was a positive day where people listened and considered together.

After this day of conferring the circuit leadership team reflected on the conversations. They have formed a recommendation of the circuit could be reshaped. This recommendation will be brought to Wesley's church council that will help to inform the decision of the circuit meeting.

It is important to note that no predetermined outcome has guided this process. Instead, the circuit has sought an outcome by the process of listening and conferring together.

While I recognise change can be daunting, I am also reminded of a Methodist hymn (*page 7*) that is pertinent for us.

CELEBRATING THE LIFE OF HELEN



We celebrated the life of our friend and church family member, Helen Evison on 29 January. Family and friends from far and wide joined Malcolm, Cathy, Beth and Alexander in a celebratory service led by our minister Gordon. Helen's brother David gave a eulogy on behalf of the family and Mike paid this tribute to Helen.

Four years ago I received a certificate for having been a local preacher for 25 years and I was reminded of one of those life-changing encounters we have from time to time.

It happened about 35 years ago when I was a new and nervous steward on duty at Wesley. One of the tasks was to welcome visitors and the preacher for the service. A lady arrived who looked as though she had perhaps been shopping and had wandered in to join us. It turned out that she was the preacher

She was unlike any other local preacher I had seen up to that point. She came just an ordinary, and I mean that as a compliment, person carrying a shopping bag. She seemed very nervous and unsure of herself. Well, we said a prayer together in the vestry, she pulled out of her shopping bag her sermon and stepped up into the pulpit and was transformed. She became authoritative. She delivered a wonderful service. She was confident and was clearly filled with the Holy Spirit. And she inspired me to become a local preacher.

That lady was Helen – as I'm sure you know by now. She was right to be nervous. Wesley was a daunting place to preach – a congregation probably above a hundred people, a gowned choir and in those days we preached from the pulpit. But the particular reason she would have been nervous was her deep understanding of the responsibility preachers have to build peoples' faith and understanding of what it means to be a disciple of Jesus.

And that wasn't true of Helen only when she was preaching. Her whole life was filled with love and care for others at whatever cost to herself and it must have hurt her terribly when illness meant she could no longer preach or do the other caring things that she had built her life around.

Helen was a loving and much-loved soul who left everyone she encountered feeling better for knowing her. I hope she knew just how much she was loved.

It would be a fitting memorial to Helen for us all to follow in her footsteps – and for us to make sure we let others know how much you love them and how much they mean to you. **Mike Greenberg**

Each other round in circles, and heard the eldest speak:

The rains are from His dripping wing, the moonbeams from His eye.
I passed a little further on and heard a lotus talk:
*Who made the world and ruleth it, He hangeth on a stalk,
For I am in His image made, and all this tinkling tide
Is but a sliding drop of rain between His petals wide.*
A little way within the gloom a roebuck raised his eyes
Brimful of starlight, and he said: *The Stamper of the Skies,
He is a gentle roebuck; for how else, I pray, could He
Conceive a thing so sad and soft, a gentle thing like me?*
I passed a little further on and heard a peacock say:
*Who made the grass and made the worms and made my feathers
gay,
He is a monstrous peacock, and He waveth all the night
His languid tail above us, lit with myriad spots of light.*

And the first verse of this hymn was brought to mind:

Every star shall sing a carol,
Every creature high or low.
Come and praise the King of Heaven
By whatever name you know.
God above man below,
Holy is the name I know.
