MESSAGE FROM OUR MINISTER CHRISTINE

One of the hymns in our last hymn book contained these words...

Lord God, by whom all change is wrought By whom new things to birth are brought, In whom no change is known...

We rest in our eternal God And make secure and sweet abode With thee, who changest not.

Spirit, who makest all things new Thou leadest onward we pursue The heavenly march sublime...

New births of grace new raptures bring Triumphant, the new song we sing The great Renewer bless...

You will find the whole hymn, written by Thomas Hornblower Gill in Hymns and Psalms number 39.

As indeed have half the helper team and over half the drivers. There were 24 drivers, including four who took out the lunches to house-bound folks.

The quiz topic was nursery rhymes, which was good fun, but also, I think, took most of the guests on a happy trip down memory lane. The winning table got every question right. Next year it will be on fairy tales, so get swatting up any prospective guests!

The popular carols were sung with gusto, occasionally in a different key to that being played on the piano.

Finally tea, coffee, mince pies and Christmas cake saw them all topped up before they were taken home.

For many of these folks Christmas Day can be the loneliest day of the year, with all normal facilities closed. Aren't we fortunate in being able to make it so different for them?

Hope by Rev. Jennifer Potter



'Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen. Indeed by faith our ancestors received approval. By faith we understand that the worlds were prepared by the word of God, so that what is seen was made from things that are not visible.' (Hebrews 11:1-3).

Faith and hope are inextricably linked in this wonderful passage from the Epistle to the Hebrews. Christians are called upon to be people not only of faith but of hope, even in situations of despair when all around seems doom and gloom.

We can cite examples of this in recent history. Christians were at the forefront of the struggle against apartheid in South Africa although we do have to remember that some Christians in that country undergirded the ideology with a religious justification. Nelson Mandela personified this unshakeable hope despite his long years of incarceration.

Last year, with our weeks of hot temperatures and lack of rainfall, we have seen a resurgence in discussions about climate change and global warming, recently revisited at the Conference in Poland. There are people who are 'deniers' and there are people who are prophets of doom and believe that it is too late to stave off the worst effects of climate change. In this context, too, it is important that Christians remain people of hope, as the Methodist Church has tried to do with its discussions about the phasing out of the use of fossil fuels and the advocating of simpler and more sustainable lifestyles. If we lose hope in such situations as these we have no motivation, no agency in affecting the future. If we retain hope we will work to see how that might become a reality however difficult the details.

Last year I was very impressed by an article in a newspaper written by a Muslim about the predominantly Buddhist young Thai football team who became stranded in the cave by a tremendous rainstorm. I think all of us were very emotionally engaged with what happened and have been reminded of the incident recently when the British divers involved received honours in the New Year's List. At the outset it seemed very likely that they could not be rescued. The situation looked quite bleak and hopeless. The boys and their coach were young, trapped in near total darkness three kilometres from the entrance, with little food or water and the route out was flooded, narrow and convoluted.

As the world held its breath the situation indeed seemed pretty hopeless and, as the days went by and the monsoon rain season came closer the prospects for a rescue grew increasingly slim. Yet hope was alive in the attitude of the boys and their coach. Hope against the odds was present in the efforts of their rescuers despite the death of one of the Thai rescuers and hope was in the decisions of the Thai authorities whose every move needed courage. In this case hope was rewarded and there was rejoicing and relief around the world.

The concept of hope, the practice of hope has long been disparaged by serious thinkers. For many people hope is just too 'woolly' a concept, too 'religious' a concept to be taken seriously. Like religion in general some see it as 'the opium of the people' – pie in the sky when you die.



Well it has to be recognised that hope does not always result in the wonderful outcome that we saw with the young Thai boys. To act on hope is always a matter of acting without certainty and to risk disappointment but not to hope is to abdicate our responsibility for trying to make the world a better place, to have agency in our lives and the lives of others. For Christians hope is an essential part of our faith – 'the assurance of things hoped for.' Our hope is based on our understanding of God, on the life, death and resurrection of Jesus and above all on the love and grace of God shown to his people throughout history. This hope will not always answer all our difficulties but it will give us the strength to go on when all seems lost. The story of Nelson Mandela, Malala Yousafzai and those young Thai footballers should be a source of encouragement and strength to all of us as we look around at a world where it is all too easy to lose hope in our political and economic systems.

And in our own lives when things seem bleak – hope and faith are what can sustain us. May hope, hope in Christ sustain us whatever the vagaries of 2019 may deliver up for us and our loved ones.

The UCI Road World Championships September 2019. This will probably be the biggest event Harrogate has ever known and we can expect some sever disruption when our town will truly become the centre of the sporting world when the best cyclists of the world travel to Yorkshire to compete for the highest accolade road cycling can bestow – the title of World Champion, and the iconic 'Rainbow Jersey' that accompanies it.

The Championships take place 21 – 29 September with races starting in towns and cities across Yorkshire, and every race will make its way around Yorkshire before heading to one ultimate finish line in Harrogate.

Races will come to Harrogate through the towns of Boroughbridge, Masham, Pateley Bridge, Ripon and across the Nidderdale Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty – and will include some of the most popular roads and climbs from the previous five years of elite cycle races in Yorkshire

Harrogate Welcomes The World. In a build up to this great event there will be a year of installations and events to celebrate Harrogate's place at the centre of the 2019 World Championships. Harrogate welcomes the World will run from January and culminate in the week of racing around Yorkshire where Harrogate will take centre stage as the finish line destination where every race of the championships will end.
